Last November I received a call from Mark Holshoe saying that there was an area just north of me that had been washed out forming a bowl shaped depression along the shoreline. Low tide was at 8.30 A.M. so I arrived at the spot at 7.30. Right away I started digging up lead sinkers and coins. I had so many targets that I slowed down and started working a grid from the high bank right down to the water. The first ring was a 14kt with a very large stone. I figured that there was no way it could be real so it went into my pocket and I continued. A short time later I got that low growl right at the waters edge. It took several scoops with the waves filling my hole after every scoop but I was finally able to get ahead of it and pulled out a very wide 14kt band. Now I was pumped 2 rings in that small area. I continued digging coins and sinkers when about 1/2 way up the bank I got that low growl again. I figured no way but it was another 14kt with 33 diamonds in three rows.

The tide was coming in and I ended up with another silver band before the water was so high that I had to quit. My wife's name is Jean and in the camp ground where we stay there has been a standing joke that I was always looking for the Jean diamond. I showed her the silver band, then the wide 14kt band followed by the 14kt with 33 diamonds. Then I made a big deal of showing her the solitaire saying I had finally found the Jean diamond. At that time I still didn't believe the stone was real. We went over to some friends to show them my finds and I took my diamond tester with. When we tested the stone and found out it was real I couldn't believe it. It is a 1.4 kt diamond and truly is the Jean diamond.

I called Mark and we went back at low tide that evening and I found another 14kt band with 11 small diamonds in a row. The following morning the area gave up its last ring a 14 kt with 3 small diamonds. They say that gold doesn't move. I have trouble believing that this small area away from a major swimming area gave up 3 gold rings all 14kt. There is no way all 5 rings were lost right there especially that quality of rings. I truly believe that there is gold moving up and down the beach and when it gets trapped in a depression or an area that's washed out, you're going to have a great day.
